

National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day



February 7, 2022 is National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day

In 1999, National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day (NBHAAD) began as a grassroots-education effort to create awareness about HIV and AIDS in communities of color.

NBHAAD and Community Education

NBHAAD helps educate the public about the effects of HIV/AIDS and advancements in treatment, including:

- Pre-exposure prophylaxis, or PrEP, is a pill taken by those without HIV to reduce their risk of contracting the disease from sex by 99% and intravenous drug use by 74%.
- Post-exposure prophylaxis, or PEP, prevents
 HIV if taken within three days of exposure.
- Data shows patients who maintain their HIV medication can become "undetectable."

 This means viral load is undetectable by a standard lab test and HIV cannot be transmitted through sex.
- Weill Cornell Medicine participated in a clinical trial funded by the National Institute of Health to study the results of a new FDA-approved injectable medication used to treat HIV.
